Traffic Calming Update: Park Blvd and Flashing Stop Signs

Two speed tables and additional traffic striping were installed to reduce speed on Park Blvd. near Cappuccino High School. Speed tables are flat topped and so will not impact emergency vehicles or buses to the same degree as speed bumps, making sure that response times are not impacted.

Flashing beacons were installed at the Taylor/Magnolia, El Bonito/Hillcrest, and Hillcrest Magnolia Intersections. This effort serves as a pilot program to gauge effectiveness of the traffic calming tool on stop time.

After your form is submitted our engineers will review the request. First, an engineer will conduct a speed study to see if a response is necessary. They will collect data on how fast cars are traveling, depending on the results, the engineers will either deny the application, or continue on in the review process.

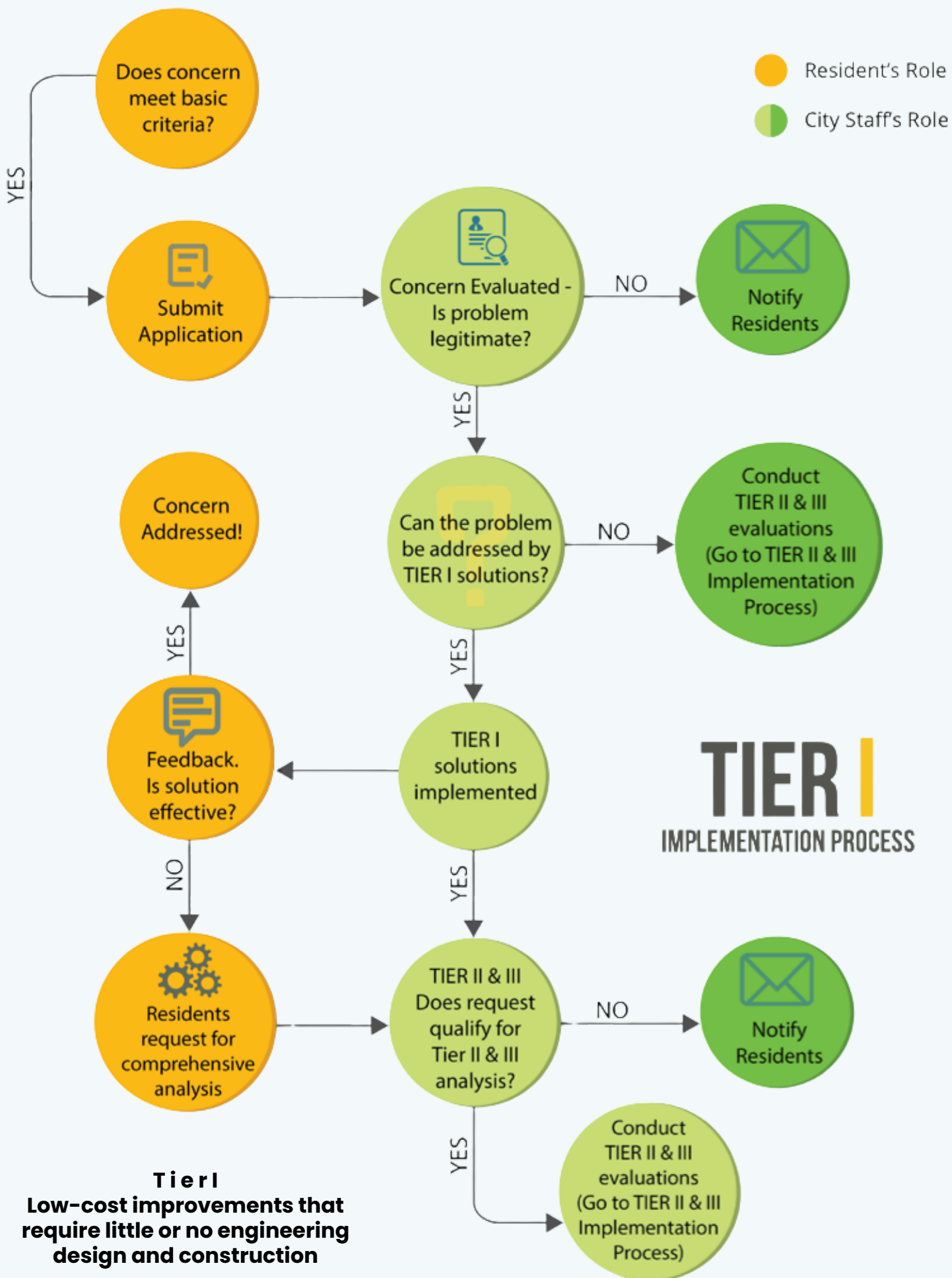
Stop Sign with Flashing Beacon

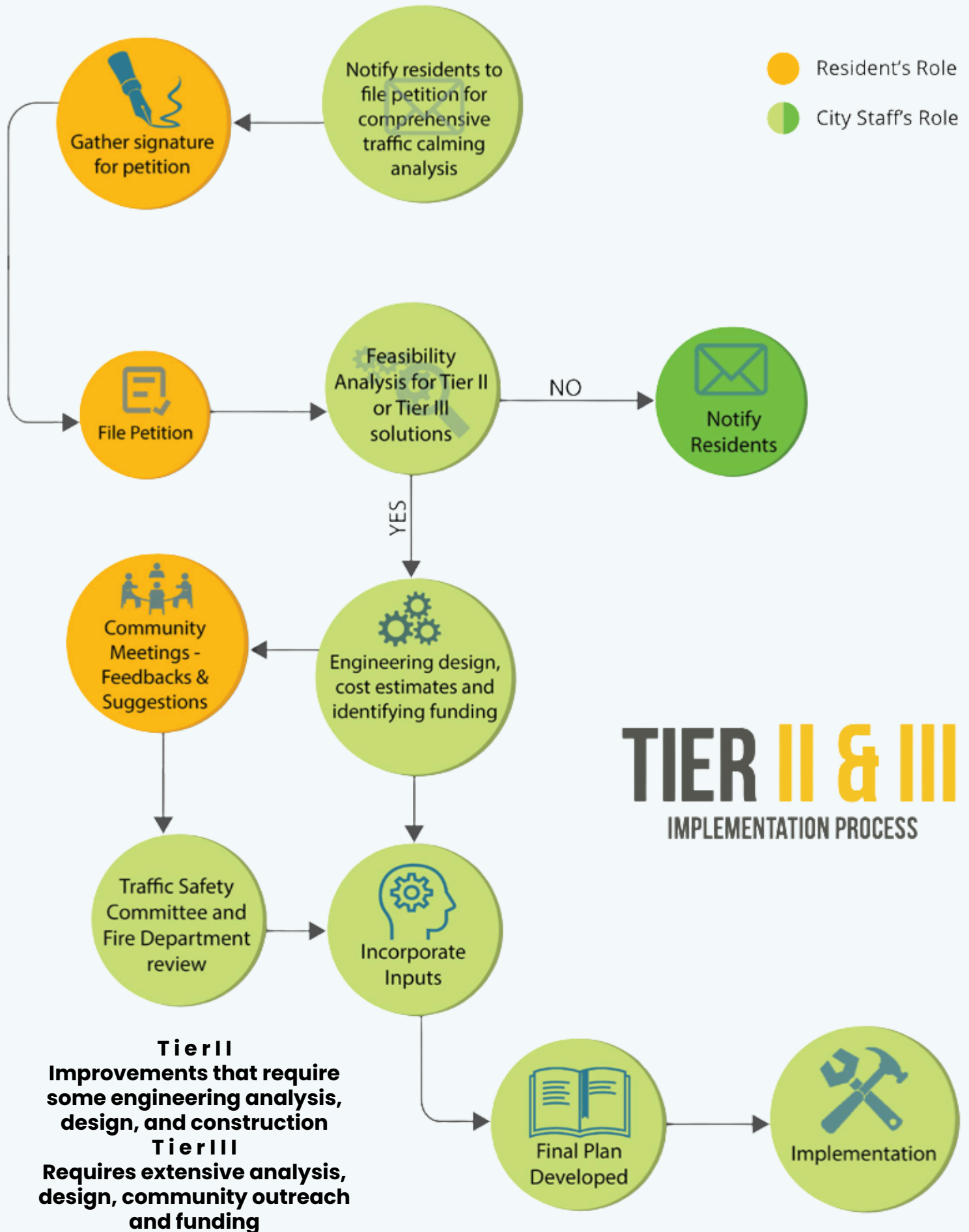
Our engineering department meet bi-monthly with a cross-departmental study group that includes representatives from Fire, Police, and Planning, to review any requests that have passed the speed study. The group will consider a number of concerns including emergency routes, response times, stop time compliance, and much more.

In some cases our engineers will consult outside traffic engineers to conduct signal timing analysis, traffic volume, turning movement counts (how many vehicles go through the light, whether they make a right, left or go straight).

Your safety is our biggest concern. Please do not hesitate to file a Traffic Calming form or contact our Engineering Division.

How to dispose of your tree

Still hanging onto your tree? Here's how to say goodbye to the holidays responsibly.

- Remove the stand and ALL decorations including lights and tinsel
- Cut tree in half if it is over 6ft
- Place your tree at the curb by 5 am on your regular collection day

DO NOT bag your tree

A special truck may be used to collect trees in your neighborhood. This truck can arrive earlier or later than our regular collection trucks. **Flocked and artificial trees cannot be recycled** and will be collected by the regular garbage route.

Ever wonder what happens once your tree is picked up? When the holidays are over, natural Christmas trees don't go to waste, they get recycled into mulch and wood chips!

Your tree continues to give back long after the holidays are over by nourishing gardens, parks and landscapes.

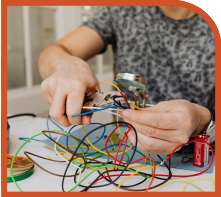
